ENGAGING BEYOND



AM WRIT-ING THESE WORDS in the middle of May, fully aware that by the time they reach you everything will

have changed. Ever since the Covid-19 pandemic spread to the United States in March, each week has brought a new reality, and we have needed to continually readjust our thinking, our plans, and our expectations.

Nonetheless, I would like to use this space to speak about our communal situation in the midst of these uncharted waters. Taking the broadest possible perspective, I'd like to reflect upon several basic questions:

- 1. How are we doing as a congregation?
- 2. How will we get through this?
- 3. What values are guiding us?

The answers to these questions, I hope, will not change from week to week, or from month to month.

1. How are we doing as a congregation?

We as a community have responded to this challenge with energy, creativity, compassion and optimism. An explosion of "Zoom" programming for Hebrew and Netivot classes on Zoom, and speaking eloquently about what they are learning. Creative and meaningful celebrations of Passover, Holocaust Remembrance Day and Israel Independence Day. Care packages for the isolated, and an absolute commitment to our entire staff that each one of them is part of our family and will be cared for.

At the same time, there is real hardship right here among our community. Breadwinners out of work. Families unable to attend their own parents' funerals. Working parents with small children utterly burned out on "Zoom" and desperate to get back to school. Kids devastated that summer camp has been cancelled. Bat and Bar Mitzvahs and weddings postponed

So, I am tremendously proud of our congregation—our staff, our lay leaders, our members and especially our miraculous children—but in my quiet moments, I ponder where we will find the inner strength to keep this up, perhaps for many months to come.

2. How will we get through this?

Many of you have shared with me that during this pandemic you have thought about the Jews during the Holocaust, or other terrible times in our history. I truly believe that our history is a storehouse for us, filled with memory, and ancient wisdom, and powerful role models of individuals, families and communities surviving hard times together.

We have survived enemies who sought to destroy us.









We have endured grinding poverty, in which children and parents went to bed hungry night after night.

We have lived among neighbors who hated and resented us for our difference.

This coronavirus pandemic, with its unpredictable contagion and lethality, and its devastating financial impact, is testing us as most of us have never been tested before in our lives. But we Jews have known adversity, and adversity has taught us to seek and to find the deepest wells of our spiritual strength. Our spiritual strength will get us through this test.

3. What values are guiding us?

This is the most important question of all, for each of us individually and for us as a community. We have endured as a people, throughout all the centuries, precisely because of our unwavering commitment to our key values. Among those are:

- A belief in the sanctity of every human life
- Our collective responsibility to care for the most vulnerable among us
- Reverence for our elderly

- A commitment to seek and to tell the truth, clearly and courageously
- A belief that our human ability to think and reason is a gift from God
- Our insistence on transmitting the timeless wisdom of our tradition to our children
- Our understanding that we are inextricably bound up with each other, with the other inhabitants of this planet, with the planet itself
- A profound respect for people of all ethnicities and religions
- A sense of humor
- A refusal to despair

Our response to the Covid-19 pandemic will be guided by these fundamental Jewish values, which have kept us alive and sustained us, and will continue to sustain us for generations to come.

YEAR IN REVIEW

WITH CANTOR MARK CHILDS

As with everything else at CBB and the rest of the world, this year has been split between events before and after the pandemic. Here are just some of the 2019-2020 highlights from Cantor Mark Childs.



New Jewish Music

Last fall, CBB was lucky enough to premier *Ki Hinei Kachomer* in front of a crowd of hundreds at Yom Kippur. This gorgeous choral and instrumental work, by composer Jonathan Comisar, was the latest commission in the "Cantor's Fund for New Jewish

Music at Congregation B'nai B'rith." Made possible through a generous grant by Laurie Harris, the fund permits the commission of a new piece of music each year, overseen

by, and in collaboration with, Cantor Childs. Best of all, the large-scale arrangement of *Ki Hinei Kachomer* — which included flute, cello, piano, choir, soloists, and of course Cantor Childs himself — was perfect for the grandeur of Yom Kippur.



MLK Jr. Shabbat

For several years we've celebrated the birthday of one of our

country's greatest moral leaders through inspiring musical collaborations. So it was this year, when CBB joined forces with the Martin Luther King, Jr. Committee of Santa Barbara to create a Shabbat service that included our Shir Chadash Choir, along with the Unitarian Society choir, and Rabbi Daniel Brenner's Shir Halleluyah musicians. Along with guest speakers, the packed service was treated to several gospel songs, including Unclouded Sky and How Long, along with music from our Shir Halleluyah services.

Showers of Blessing

Showers of Blessing has provided free, hot showers to people experiencing homelessness around Santa Barbara county since its launch in 2015. And over the past five years, the mobile shower unit's reach has grown tremendously — offering some 25,000 showers, along with free 30-day packs of biodegradable outdoor wipes, free new underwear, free socks, toiletries and razors. As president of the Interfaith Initiative of Santa Barbara County — which oversees and supports Showers of Blessing — Cantor Childs has managed CBB's significant sponsorship of this project. OPENDOR

REACHES OUT TO SPIRITUAL JEWS IN THEIR 20s & 30s

BEGINNING IN LATE 2018, Rabbi Daniel Brenner reached out to many of the young millennial Jews he'd been meeting for several months in Santa Barbara. At salon-style dinners he hosted for young people in their 20s through late 30s, including individuals and couples, professionals and graduate students, he'd ask about our upbringing, how we were achieving balance in our lives, our religious practice, and what kind of Jewish community and engagement would be meaningful.

My husband and I attended one of these dinners, and it's bittersweet to say that it was the first time in the eight years since graduating UCSB that I had been in a room with 20 Jews my own age. This experience drove home the need for our own community, one where we could come together to find belonging, to learn and practice our spiritual Jewishness with others.

And we millennials needed this. While we might not be as religious in the traditional sense as other generations, we're definitely spiritual. According to the Pew Research Center, 46% of younger adults say they feel a deep sense of wonder about the universe at least once a week, and 55% say they think about the meaning and purpose of life on a weekly basis.

OpenDor officially launched in 2019 with a Passover Seder attended by more than 60 people, and the excitement was palpable. It was clear that all were delighted to celebrate with other young people. The playfulness and spirit of the room gave off the feeling that all were sitting at the "kids' table" at your family's Seder!

The momentum continued with monthly Shabbat services complete with Pre-Neg, a service led by Rabbi Brenner with summer camp songs, and a social dinner. "I came to Santa Barbara knowing no one, but after only one OpenDor



Shabbat, I felt like I had a whole new group of friends," participant David Weitz says.

Following CBB's Yom Kippur services last September, Open-Dor hosted a 55-person Break-Fast at the home of Bob and Janice Ingrum (generous hosts of this event for many years) and closed out the year with a Hanukkah "Chinese Food and a Movie" party.

In the first months of 2020, OpenDor has continued its Shabbat services, which have seen anywhere from 25 to 45 new and familiar faces. And it also held smaller gatherings that included hikes and mindfulness practices. More recently, during this spring's pandemic, 38 of us joined together for a virtual Seder which featured homemade Seder plates, a read-along Haggadah, and a nostalgic viewing of the *Rugrats* cartoon Passover episode.

Something that's unique about OpenDor is that its events range beyond the walls of the CBB campus, often situated in spaces around downtown Santa Barbara. Hosting events in spaces like the former location of Impact Hub on Chapala, at Girls Inc, or most recently at Youth Interactive, allows young professionals to more easily access Jewish community after work on Friday evenings. And it removes

FOR THE CHALLENGE!

HERE IS NO QUESTION these are challenging times. Fear of the virus, social distancing, isolation, and the economic aftermath affect every one of us. But we are meeting it all with love and the power of community. This crisis illustrates that CBB is not defined by the bricks and mortar

On March 13, with increasing information about the benefits of social distancing and keeping in mind our at-risk population, we chose to discontinue public access to CBB. That evening Rabbi Steve Cohen and Cantor Mark Childs held a Shabbat service in the empty sanctuary, broadcasting to anxious congregants at home. Rabbi Cohen gave a loving tribute to Natalie Myerson on the occasion of her 100th birthday.

Very quickly thereafter Rabbi Daniel Brenner and the staff conjured up a virtual synagogue, in partnership with CBB's very generous Noel Cohen of Zoom. Many of us had never heard of Zoom – and now suddenly we were thrown into a world of Brady Bunch screen shots of our community. In a time of great uncertainty, it was, and is, reassuring to see the faces of friends and loved ones.

We have continued to provide a robust variety of religious offerings, with often more than 100 screens participating in our programs. Passover brought out the creative side of

staff and clergy with an informative and funny Passover Resource Guide. We had an infinite dining table for Passover Seder with Rabbi Cohen leading hundreds in a Seder we will always lovingly remember.

Our preschoolers and their parents have been embraced with love by preschool director Maguy McGuire and her amazing staff who have provided story time, Shabbats, and drive-by activity kits and handouts to keep little hands busy while parents work. Sing-alongs with Cantor Mark and Science with Helen Curhan engage the kiddies as well.


Jen Lewis, Director of Jewish Learning Programs, and her teachers helped our Netivot students continue with their classes, through a transition to technology-based learning. Eric Capelle, our Youth Engagement Coordinator, has reached out to teens, keeping them engaged as a community.

Our OpenDor program, created by Rabbi Brenner, has held virtual seders, Shabbats, trivia nights, Passover cooking classes, learning sessions, and mindfulness/meditation classes to ease the stress during this difficult time.

Cantor Childs and his many talented guests have filled our lives and computer speakers with music. Cantor's classes have ranged from the academic to the entertaining – well, knowing Cantor they are always entertaining – bringing a smile to the face of every participant!

We are incredibly lucky to have offered a wide range of

classes provided by our own talented congregants! The response to these programs has been overwhelming. On the academic side, Dr. Richard Hecht, Steve Zipperstein, Aaron Edelheit, Dr. Jay Winner, Dr. Peter Rupert, Craig Zimmerman and Dr. Dan Curhan have provided meaningful seminars on topics ranging from Jewish History to the Covid 19 virus. Many others in our community have donated their time offering heartwarming classes in Mussar (Nina Gelman Gans), Mindful Meditation (Renee Golan) and Dream Circle (Amy Katz).

To get here, one of the first things we did was reach out to all our members. The reasons were two-fold, both to help reassure our community we would be there for them, and to identify those who might need assistance. Led by our tireless and devoted Director of Community Engagement, Mariela Socolovsky, Caring Community chair Nick Woolf and Co-leader Audrie Krause, many volunteers in the Caring Community attended to those of us in need with love, care, and respect. Kudos also to Jackie Sereboff for coordinating the soup making in time before the shelter-in-place and Isabelle Kim-Sherman for making tons of mini challahs to deliver with the soup. Thanks also to Glen Serbin for coordinating meals for Transition House.

Additionally, efforts by Amy Katz and her volunteers have made a significant difference for the Santa Barbara homeless. Thanks to many of you for your donations of clothing and other support items.

Many people are experiencing food insecurity and financial stresses. CBB stands ready to help. We've established a Covid-19 Emergency Fund which has been generously supported by our community. These funds help the most vulnerable among us. Short term grants are given for food, housing and medical needs. Although we cannot provide long term solutions to these problems, we can offer a bridge until government aid can kick in.

I am so proud to be a part of CBB. This crisis did not paralyze us but made us even stronger. We are truly blessed to have magnificent clergy, a monumental Executive Director in Elizabeth Gaynes, and a driven and creative staff. Their passion, dedication, and commitment is unparalleled. Our fellow congregants have given of their time, resources and love to help make CBB a place to flourish in these most challenging times. I don't have an answer for the days ahead but know that we will tackle the future with the same drive to do our best and provide our community with an inspiring heart.

New Curriculum

As the head of our B'mitzvah program, Cantor Childs has always had a big hand in shaping the wonderful (if sometimes challenging!) spiritual journey of CBB's 12-13 year-olds. The latest change has come in the form of an exciting new addition to our 6th grade curriculum, completed with the help of Jen Lewis and Eric Capelle. These pre-b'mitzvah lessons, created by Moving Traditions, aim to help our students (and their parents) talk about many of the issues they face as they move into becoming teens and adults.

Purim After Dark 2020

Claims that Elvis has left the building were clearly premature, as the King of Rock'n'Roll made a very special appearance at our Purim After Dark gala in March! Embodied in his earthly form by Cantor Childs, who grew out his sideburns for this special occasion, the King sang a medley of Blue Suede Shoes, All Shook Up and Viva Las Vegas. "Elvis" was joined by none other than "Elton John" (as channeled by Rabbi Daniel Brenner), whose performance helped CBB to raise much needed funds for CBB's educational programs.

Moving to a Virtual World

One of the highlights of this year was the speed with which CBB clergy and staff moved to create a wide swath of services, events, and classes each week, bringing community connection and Jewish enrichment to our "at home" congregation. A big part of that response was Cantor Childs, who along with Rabbis Cohen and Brenner helped to create a meaningful worship experience online. Alongside that, Cantor Childs also created a very popular "Hootenanny and Havdalah" series on Saturday nights (over 750 views in many cases), Friday "Lunch & Learn" sessions, and adapted the Saturday morning service to include some of CBB's first-ever "Zoom Mitzvah" (virtual B'mitzvah). And, after the popularity of his Melton course on "Jewish Humor: From Sinai to Seinfeld" this past winter, he was asked again to offer this online in April, with attendance ranging from 150 to 350 per class.

the hesitation of attending a large, unfamiliar service. OpenDor has 'opened the door' of CBB to millennials in a soft, yet engaging way, and has created a safe space for these young Jews to meet and thrive together.

"I was raised as a part of the CBB Jewish community, but coming back to town after college, I was unable to easily connect with likeminded Jews. I didn't realize this was a void in my life until I found OpenDor," says Jessica Shultz, another participant. "Attending various OpenDor gatherings and meeting new people, has made me realize how strongly I value being a part of a Jewish community. I am grateful for all that OpenDor has provided me," she says.



To date, OpenDor events have hosted more than 100 unique individuals and more than 450 participants in total. In turn, OpenDor

members are also participating in CBB life: they're showing up at services, events, and learning opportunities, and they're becoming CBB members.

Though spearheaded by millennials for millennials, OpenDor could not exist without the love and support of the greater CBB community, and we are so grateful that CBB believes in our mission to push back against the spiritual loneliness our generation faces by creating a space to encourage Jewish togetherness, community and practice. We look forward to continuing to grow and strengthen this young and vibrant community!

The Melton School of Santa Barbara at CBB: 2019-2020

Launched in 2016 and led by director Judy Karin, The Melton School is a text- and discussion-based adult Jewish education program. Melton seeks to engage learners in the wonderful study of Jewish texts and ideas, with an accessible approach that fosters open dialogue and nurtures a deepening of Jewish community.

The cohorts run for two years — students take two core classes, "Rhythms of Jewish Living and Purposes of Jewish Living" in year one, and "Ethics of Jewish Living and Crossroads of Jewish History" in Year 2. But there are many additional opportunities besides: Jews in America, The Star & The Crescent (about Judaism and Islam), From Sinai to Seinfeld (about Jewish humor), and Remember My Name! (about Holocaust diaries and memoirs) are just some of the classes we've offered over the past few years.

Classes are intentionally small, with 15 to 18 students to facilitate learning. Still, over four years we've enrolled 122 people in our program, some of whom have taken multiple classes (for 180 total enrollments). And while the Covid-19 pandemic forced us to move online (as it did everyone else), we finished both our Year 1 and Year 2 core classes successfully online.
